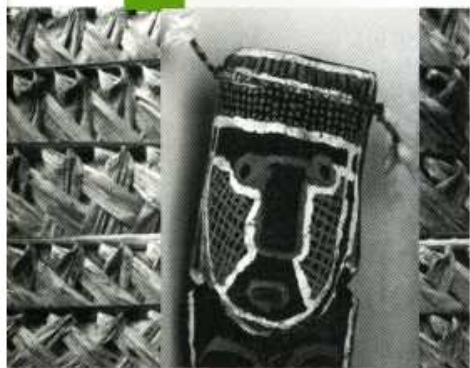

Melburnians are proud of their heritage and the work of our forefathers, and we believe the continued preservation of our historic and new structures will be a major strength to future generations.

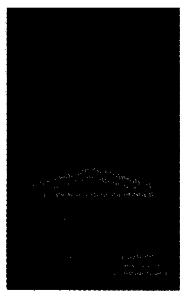

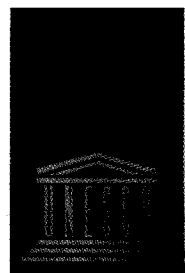




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Third International Forum UNESCO: University and Heritage



Introduction

The 'Forum UNESCO: University and Heritage' was established by UNESCO jointly with the Universidad Politécnica de Valencia at a meeting in Valencia, Spain, in October 1996. The initial meeting was attended by nearly 80 delegates representing 41 countries. The forum's headquarters are at the Universidad Politécnica de Valencia where a worldwide database of university heritage courses, scholars and projects has been created. The second forum was held at Laval University in Quebec, Canada, in 1997, where the aims and objectives of the network were further developed, and a set of priority projects involving international cooperation drawn up.

This network was established following a process of reflection and mutual consultation on the part of teachers and students committed to this project, in close cooperation with the International Council of Museums (ICOM), the International Council of Monuments and Sites (ICOMOS), the International Centre for the Study of the Preservation and the Restoration of Cultural Property (ICCROM), the International Federation of Landscape Architects (IFLA) and the International Union of Architects (UIA), as well as with national officials responsible for the cultural heritage.

The third Forum UNESCO is set in the Asia-Pacific region. A major concern at this forum is the threat posed by rapid economic globalising forces to the cultural heritage of Asian and Pacific communities, as in the world generally. The forum mobilises university specialists and students on a united national and international front to investigate such threats and to devise strategies and cooperative projects to preserve the cultural heritage. This network of university professionals also promotes the teaching of heritage studies and the involvement of students in heritage projects that will help in passing on the mission of preservation and protection to the next generation.

The main theme of the third Forum UNESCO will be the development of international cooperative projects in the heritage field. This will provide an opportunity for heritage specialists across the world to meet, to learn about each other's work and to promote the protection of the cultural heritage through cooperative university projects. In particular, it is expected that a number of partnerships in the heritage field will be established between developed and developing countries.

The third Forum UNESCO will also work to increase awareness among young people of heritage issues by encouraging them to participate in development programs and projects related to cultural heritage preservation. Universities are urged to support students who want to accompany academic staff attending the forum in October. This will give added impetus to the push to educate the next generation in the broader mission of the forum.



Key objectives of Forum UNESCO

At a time when universities worldwide are developing a more marked interest in heritage, Forum UNESCO has taken upon itself the mission of encouraging exchange and dialogue between the various universities on an international scale.

The key objectives of this international network are to:

- Mobilise the human and technical resources of the universities to cooperate nationally and internationally in protecting and enhancing the cultural heritage
- Create a national and international network for solidarity, mutual assistance and the exchange of knowledge and skills between universities on issues of the cultural heritage
- Encourage the development of heritage studies in universities, emphasising both theory and practical experience
- Strengthen inter-university cooperation by transferring knowledge and exchanging know-how in the field of heritage
- Encourage student participation in heritage projects and so ensure that universities are able directly to impress upon the next generation the importance of protecting the cultural inheritance
- Promote mutual understanding and a multicultural dialogue for peace

Strategies for action

The Forum UNESCO's strategies for action are to:

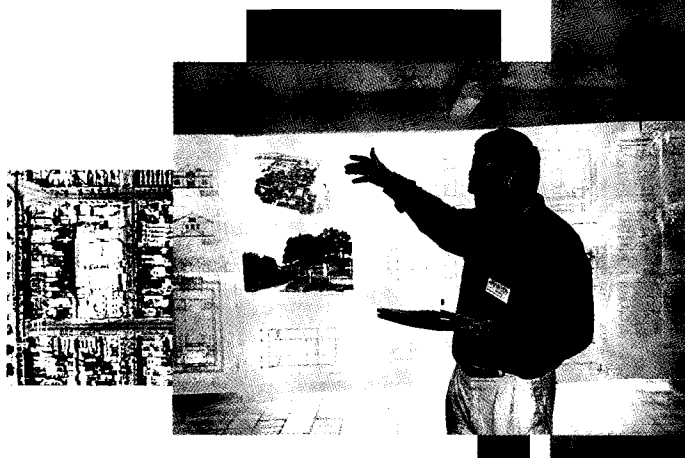
- Create regional and national components of the global forum network
- Develop a nucleus of students and teachers in each university participating in forum meetings
- Establish links with other universities working in the heritage field
- Implement jointly the appropriate machinery for efficient coordination
- Reinforce cooperation between global, regional, national and local cultural heritage officials and the universities
- Create a UNESCO Forum data bank
- Encourage the teaching of cultural heritage across many university faculties, including by the creation of UNESCO cultural heritage chairs
- Identify concrete operational projects involving inter-university cooperation

Priority projects in 1998

- The creation of a Communication Platform between participating universities involving the continuous updating of the forum's Website, the publication of the Quebec Seminar Report and the publication and dissemination of a regular newsletter
- An international competition to design a logo for the *UNESCO Convention 1970 on the Means of Prohibiting and Preventing the Illicit Import, Export and Transfer of Ownership of Cultural Properties*
- The restoration of a unique house made of wood in Bursa, Turkey



- The conversion of an ancient prison in Jacqmal, Haiti, into a House of Culture
- International Youth Camps in Mexico and Cuba
- The preparation, with the collaboration of University Quisqueya, Haiti, of an inventory of cultural heritage that takes into account priorities in the wider social and economic context
- The implementation of the Network *Forum UNESCO: University and Heritage*, on a national and sub-regional level in Saudi Arabia
- Training workshop for cultural heritage, an establishment of a national heritage inventory, and the cooperation with Quebec for an enhancement of cultural property values in the field of pottery – Central Africa and Togo
- The development of a cooperative link between *Forum UNESCO: University and Heritage* and the Organisation of InterAmerican Universities, working within the projects, *The College of America* implemented by Laval University, Quebec, the University of Bahia, Brazil, and the University of Guanajuato, Mexico
- The listing, cataloguing and protection of modern architectural works in Buenos Aires led by the University of Buenos Aires and l'École d'Architecture de Paris-Belleville, and other universities
- The creation of two new UNESCO Chairs:
 - (i) Urbanisation and Protection of the Cultural Heritage, Deakin University, Australia
 - (ii) Protection of Humanity's Heritage, Laval University, Quebec, Canada

Friday 9 October: Optional post-forum events

Option 1: Half-day site visits with ICOMOS Australia and the National Trust

Two half-day guided tours of Melbourne highlights have been organised by Australia ICOMOS in conjunction with the National Trust of Australia (Victoria). These tours can be taken together or individually.

Morning tour (0900-1230)

This tour of the central city area will take in some of Melbourne's icons including the restored ANZ Gothic Bank and Verdon apartments, CBA dome, Block Arcade, Howey House and Manchester Unity Building, Jazz Moderne gems, Melbourne Town Hall, St Paul's Cathedral, Flinders Street Station, Tasma Terrace, St Patrick's Cathedral, Parliament House and Treasury Buildings, Princess Theatre and, finally, the restored Royal Exhibition Building (presently being considered for World Heritage listing), Exhibition gardens and the new museum site under construction. The tour will be on foot and by tram.

Cost: AU\$28, including basket lunch and tour notes.

Option 2: One-day Workshop: The Disappearing Asian City

A workshop on the Australian Research Council-funded project being carried out by an international team of researchers based at Deakin University. The team is making a comparative study of urban heritage attitudes, threats, planning policies and practices in twelve cities across East, Southeast and South Asia. The study focuses on the steady erosion of what many commentators in Asia and the West have regarded as the typically 'Asian' qualities of those cities, particularly in terms of their built form and under the impact of rapid economic and cultural globalisation. The workshop represents an important point in the project when the various city sub-teams come together to read drafts, discuss ideas, establish common themes and form tentative conclusions. The workshop is open to the public.

It will also provide an opportunity to showcase recent and current research pertaining to museum issues and allow new and existing networks and affiliations to be strengthened and developed.

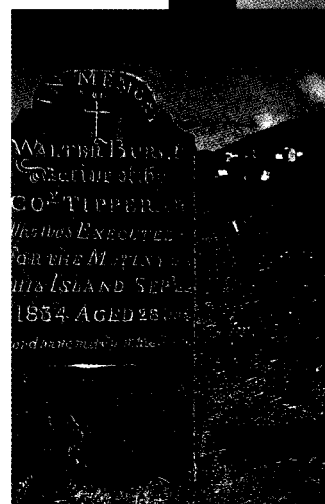

Practical information

Melbourne and Geelong

Melbourne is a multicultural city of 3.5 million people, located in the temperate southeast of the Australian continent. October is Spring in Melbourne and temperatures average a very pleasant 19–20° Celsius. This is also the month with the highest average rainfall, so be prepared. Melbourne has an excellent reputation for its restaurants, parks and gardens, historical buildings and precincts, theatres, cultural festivals and sporting events.

The city boasts many unique examples of architecture from the Victorian period (mid–late nineteenth century). Today, these are protected and loved by the community, and many have been restored to their former glory. The blend of Victorian architecture with the varied designs of subsequent eras is one of the most impressive features of the city.

Geelong is situated about 90km from Melbourne. It is Victoria's largest provincial city, with a population of about 195,000. It has played a significant role in the cultural, commercial and industrial development of the state. It is also considered the gateway to southwest Victoria, the location of many historical sites and tourist attractions.

The Conference Organising Committee through Professional Conferences International (PCI) has scheduled a number of events that take advantage of the historical sites and cultural activities the two cities and their surrounds have to offer.

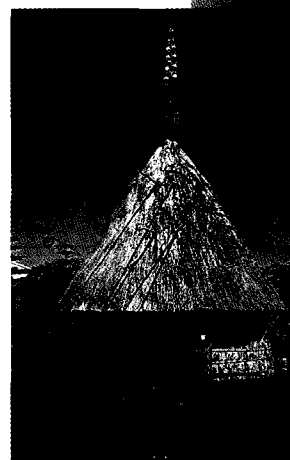
